**Draft Resolution 2.0**

**Committee:** Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice

**Topic:** Human trafficking for the purpose of organ removal and organ trafficking

**Sponsors:** The Republic of Congo, The Republic of Greece, and The Republic of Cuba

**Signatories:** Venezuela, Kenya, Indonesia, South Africa, Myanmar, Ethiopia, Chile, China, Portugal, Nigeria, Kuwait, Japan, Malaysia, Iran, Israel, Saudi Arabia, Belarus, Colombia

**Resolutions:**

1) Awareness is the best way to stop trafficking and put a halt to upcoming trafficking:

(I) We can promote this through social media campaigns, radio, podcasts, and television broadcasts with the freedom of speech, it lets the victims and scared citizens on overcoming such dangers;

(ii) This can also be done by political campaigns and protests on such issues;

2) Investigation of all officials:

(I) Doctors and officers should be analysed and complicit officials should be investigated in terms of trafficking on missing and unfinished reports;

(II) The officials should be checked on these terms and complicit officials should be convicted and charged to remove further organ trafficking issues;

3) Increase proactive identification:

(I) To prove and prevent ongoing organ trafficking cartels identification of such organisations will help as a preventive measure;

4) institutionalize, screening in minorities and ports,

5) strengthening special services:

(I) this can be done by various funding options such as NGOs' "advocation" finding fundraisers and partnerships with various organisations;

6) increase jail time and fines and sentences and frighten traffickers to stop trafficking,

7) protection of children both orphans and poverty-filled areas,

8) legal and psychological facilities should be provided for victims:

(I) legal and mental aid can help in the identification of traffickers ultimately stopping trafficking;

9) jobs and opportunities for victims in both government and private areas should be provided to help in combatting trafficking,

10) the governments have established Document Examination Office to conduct strict border control to prevent illegal entry to prevent human trafficking for organ removal,

11) Strengthen international cooperation: organ trafficking is a cross-border crime:

(I) international cooperation between countries is critical in preventing it;

(II) Government can work together to share information, intelligence, and best practices to combat organ trafficking;

12) A global shortage of organs has driven the industry to higher organ trafficking:

(I) The shortage of organs is mostly due to the shortage of doctors;

(i) The people do not want to donate organs as there are very less benefits for theas the exchange of any form of wealth for the trade of organ is illegal,

(II) Governments can increase benefits or at least allow the doers to get paid in exchange for donating organs;

(ii) even though there will be a concern about safety this might reduce organtrafficking as the demand for organs are low;

13) reducing the inflation rate:

(I) by reducing the inflation rate, people would have more economic support to satisfy their needs.
